
## **FANTASIETA**

Fantasieta (1983) is the first solo violin piece composed by Andersen Viana while he was still studying viola with Professor Paulo Bosísio (protégé of Max Rostal). This piece brings to life a series of short fantasies. Written for a wide range of instruments, each piece explores the maximum amount of artistry and technical possibilities of each instrument. Viana continues to work on this project, his latest work being titled Fantasieta for Solo Bass Clarinet (2014). Fantasieta for violin explores a diversity of sounds through various techniques such as double, triple, and quadruple stops, artificial harmonics, tremolos, glissandos, trills, and varied bow strokes, all while using the entire range of the violin from the lowest "G" to the highest "C"(1). From a compositional standpoint, it is a short piece (4'30") and relatively straightforward to play due to its idiomatic qualities. The work is structured into three sections beginning with a rhythmic introduction, *Vivo*, followed by a lyrical piece, *Lento cantabile*, and a contrasting section, *Rapido*. Rapido presents a Brazilian rhythm stemming from the styles of (2) *Choro* and (3) *Samba*, and it finalizes the musical dialogue and marks the closure of a broader section.



The following, *Un poco leggiero e giocoso*, is a lyrical section which contrasts with the previous section and presents new material. It contains a short variation in *spiccato*, reaches the recapitulation in *Lento cantabile*, and climaxes on the note "C". It then ends with a brilliant *coda* (*Presto*). This work is also transposed for solo viola.
